NATIONAL HUMAN TRAFFICKING RESOURCE CENTER (NHTRC) DATA BREAKDOWN Human Trafficking and J-1 Visa Holders Report 1/1/2011-12/31/2015

SUBSTANTIVE CALL DATA

During the five-year period between January 1, 2011 and December 31, 2015, a total of 233 substantive calls were made to the NHTRC hotline concerning the human trafficking of J-1 visas-holders. Substantive calls exclude hangups, wrong numbers, declined calls, missed calls, and calls in which the NHTRC could not determine the caller's reason for calling. J-1 visas are temporary visas for individuals to participate in work-and study-based exchange visitor programs. Workers on J-1 visas are temporarily authorized to work in the United States in a variety of professions including as camp counselors, au pairs, interns, researchers, students, and can also serve as government visitors and summer work travel participants. The following information is based on these 233 calls.


HUMAN TRAFFICKING CASE DATA

Between January 1, 2011 and December 31, 2015, the NHTRC hotline received reports of 20,728 potential human trafficking cases in the United States. A case corresponds to an incident of human trafficking. Each case may contain multiple calls about a single incident of human trafficking. **76 of these cases (incidents) involved J-1 Visa** holders. The following information is based on these cases.
